To achieve this outcome, the City of Madison should take full advantage of every tool to support economic development, like tax incremental financing. City infrastructure must also keep up with economic growth. The University of Wisconsin, located in District 8, plays a vital role in many of these development functions.

5. What is your perception of Madison's business brand? How do you think Madison is perceived locally and nationally?

Madison is perceived very strongly both locally and nationally. I want to enhance our brand further with capital and labor improvements. Madison is a college town, but it's so much more.

6. How can Madison best attract and retain a diverse workforce?

As we implement Bus Rapid Transit, we must continue to make housing improvements along these routes. Recently, I've been involved with the proposed bus center and redevelopment on Hawthorne Court. This development has highlighted the contentious issues surrounding public transit. Madison residents should get the most out of our expanding bus system. As Alder, I'll fight to make public transit accessible and affordable to everyone.

\*\*10. A challenge that often comes with growth are issues impacting crime and safety. Some of these challenges are real; others perceived. In either case, it impacts livability and our ability to recruit and retain talent to Madison. Do you view Madison as a safe community and what is the Common Council's role in building safe communities?

Public safety remains a vital issue in Madison, and crime rate reductions are essential to the success of workers and businesses. Street lighting is also a critical issue in my district, particularly along the poorly-lit southern shores of Lake Mendota. Pedestrian safety is another important safety issue I've been working on with the Campus Area Neighborhood Association.
